Message from the Mayor

Your new Council has been sworn in and has already begun what is probably the hardest part of their job: 2023 budget and strategic planning.

Our community has done great things.

We've stopped school closures, high speed rail, and a landfill. We've built splash pads, 100% renewable energy buildings that cost us all less, and will build an 88 space childcare. 7 of 8 budgets below inflation (2018 Zorra budget was 0.1% above inflation).

We need to do more of these things that will define our own community for all of us.

Many of these things will be very challenging, and none of them will be quick. But hard things are hard, and our communities have never shied away from that.

So we need a plan to get them done.

In order to deal with the challenges and opportunities we face I am proposing that the Township implement a "triple bottom line" approach of evaluating the financial, environmental, and social impacts of all issues. Each of us will weigh these differently on each issue, but these are the things to consider. Financial will not only be property tax impact, but economic development impact (which has a long term property tax impact). Environmental will be short term and local like trees and green spaces, but also long term and broad like climate change impacts. Social will be be ensuring that we strive to include everyone, and not just reactively, we need to encourage everyone's participation. Without as much participation in our communities as possible. we cannot put forward our best effort to to overcome challenges and realize opportunities. Everyone should be able to do their part.

The challenges and opportunities we need to tackle are:

- Housing, we need more quantity, variety, and affordability
- Continue the 100% renewable energy plan
- Childcare Thamesford will have a licensed space in 2023, we need one in Embro now
- We need to implement a "total life cycle cost model" for all assets and services to best manage our finances and keep taxes low
- Examine the possibility of more aggressive rebuilding of gravel roads to remove 1/2 load
- Continue to work with other levels of government to bring true high speed internet to every residence
- Continue to protect farmland and green spaces by reducing sprawl and increasing density in serviced villages
- Continue to work the the Thames Valley District School Board and the Ontario Ministry

of Education to preserve and enhance the role of our schools in our communities

Again, all these challenges and opportunities should be assessed using a "triple bottom line" approach of evaluating the financial, environmental, and social impacts of each.

The Zorra Township policies I am proposing to pursue to address these challenges and opportunities are:

- Zorra needs more than 800 new homes by 2031 for the growth that is inevitably coming, we need policies to get that done
- Secondary Plans to encourage the type of development we want, rather than only reacting to development proposals from developers. A variety of housing where we want it, while minimizing sprawl
- Implement the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan to help include more people, and address homelessness and crime
- Total life cycle cost models to better assess the true costs of assets and services
- Implement a robust Asset Management Plan to accurately forecast the maintenance and replacement costs of all assets (buildings and equipment) and plan finances accordingly
- Develop a plan to secure the future contribution of our schools to our communities

Again, all these policies should be assessed using a "triple bottom line" approach of evaluating the financial, environmental, and social impacts of each.

There are some challenges and opportunities we need to advocate and lobby the Ontario government to address:

- Fairer taxation, and improved regulation, of aggregate sites
- Rural communities shouldn't bear the costs of protecting Prime Agricultural Land on their own. The Provincial Government needs to understand that there are consequences to rural Ontario for rightly protecting Prime Agricultural Land on behalf of all Ontarians. Rural communities should not have to bear the costs (reduced growth resulting in reduced services such as schools, hospitals, infrastructure) on their own. The Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund (OMPF) should be increased to previous levels to address this unfairness.
- Our schools are integral parts of our small rural communities. The Province needs to recognize this in changed funding formulas and policies.

I started by highlighting the great things our community has done. We got those things done by hard work, and a plan. So we need to continue with the same effort if we want to continue to get results for our communities: we need a plan that can actually deliver results.

Please feel free to comment and ask questions. It's not a perfect plan, no plan is, it can get better with your input.

REDUCED LOAD SEASON - February 15 - April 30

An early reminder to all drivers of heavy trucks and equipment that the reduced load season takes effect for the period of February 15 to April 30 inclusive each year. In accordance with By-law 21-03, signs will be posted on applicable Township roadways.

HALF LOAD SEASON RATIONALE

- · Minimize long term damage to infrastructure
- Problems caused when roads are soft often require major repairs
- Prevent additional damage to culverts and bridges
- Heavy loads do damage to road sub-base that is difficult to detect
- Changes in the size of agricultural equipment i.e. large liquid manure trailers
- Multiple aggregate producers in Township
- Infrastructure repair costs borne directly or indirectly by residents

All of the above lead to safety issues during Half Load Season.


Cloudpermit allows you to apply for a permit, see the status of your application and permit anywhere, at anytime. You will receive email notifications on the status and you can

In the Spring edition we shared that not all properties in Zorra Township have a blue emergency number. Rural properties are identified by 911 signs, but properties in Zorra's villages and in town have house numbers that match the street address.



Worried Emergency Services Won't Find you?

Zorra Fire & Emergency Services not only completes training on operational firefighting skills but also those related to our local community. In addition to being certified to provincial standards, Zorra Township's firefighters must also live and/or work within our community to ensure their availability to



formulate a response when called upon. It is a part of their role as an emergency responder to know the jurisdiction they serve and the most efficient ways to navigate it.

In addition to the talents and skills of our personnel, Zorra Fire has a lot of support behind the scenes. The communication our firefighters have with dispatch and the support that team of communicators provides helps ensure Zorra Fire will get to an emergency scene in a timely fashion. They also have methods built in to communicate additional information such as road closures or alternate routes. The County GIS team provides updated maps to be carried in all apparatus and hung in the fire stations whenever changes occur and technology in the form of an App on each firefighters cell phone helps pin point exact locations of emergencies, provides photos of the property and navigational mapping data right to scene.

FIRE WON'T WAIT. PLAN YOUR ESCAPE

Today's homes burn faster than ever. It is important to have working smoke alarms and a fire plan in advance. Every household and business should have a pre-planned fire escape route so your family, and employees feel safe in event of a fire.

- Draw a map of your home. Show all doors and windows.
- Visit each room. Find two ways out.
- All windows and doors should open easily. You should be able to use them to get outside.
- Make sure your home has smoke alarms. Push the test button to make sure each alarm is working.
- Pick a meeting place outside. It should be in front of your home. Everyone will meet at the meeting place.
- Make sure your house or building number can be seen from the street.
- Talk about your plan with everyone in your home.
- Make sure everyone in your home knows how to dial 911 or your local emergency number.
- Practice your home fire drill!
- Make your own home fire escape plan using the grid provided


It is important to have a specific location in your fire safety plan to meet in case of an emergency. Make sure it is accessible to all members of your family and easy enough for children to remember!







Building an Emergency Safety Kit For Your Car

With cold weather approaching, it is important to stay alert for your safety on the roads, and inside your vehicle. Nearly 30% of Canada's car accidents occur in snow and ice conditions. To help prevent incidents this coming winter, ensure you have the proper tires on your vehicle. Winter or all-season tires are crucial as we enter cold weather conditions. Changing your tires before the weather gets bad is the perfect way to mitigate and prepare for any emergencies that may occur. It's important for drivers to use extreme caution when driving in bad weather as the chances of losing control of the vehicle are greater, and it can be more difficult to see.

Another way to be prepared is to have an emergency kit stored in your vehicle at all times. Here are some items to keep in your car in case of a roadside emergency:

- Jumper cables and/or portable battery
- Bag of sand
- Flashlight
- Blanket, hat, and mittens
- Shovel, and snow brush
- First aid kit
- Water and snacks
- Tow rope
- Cell phone charger
- Flare lights (if travelling to a remote area)



By-Law Enforcement Department

WINTER PARKING

Please be advised that the winter parking restrictions will be enforced starting November 15, 2022 and remain in place until March 31, 2023.

Parking is not permitted on any road or street from 1:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. 7 days a week during this period. Any vehicle owner found in violation of this by-law could be fined or have their vehicle removed/towed at owners' expense. The fine for this violation is set at \$50.

RECREATION VEHICLES

Notice to all RV/boat owners. The Zoning By-law allows front yard driveway storage of RVs and boats from May 1 – October 31. After October 31, front driveway storage of these vehicles shall be removed and stored elsewhere. The vehicles may be stored on your side lot or rear lot provided that they meet the 5ft setback.

LEAVES AND SNOW:

Did you know that it is a By-law infraction to push your leaves and snow onto the roadway or neighbouring properties? Depositing your leaves on the road or private property is considered dumping and is may result in a significant fine of \$700. Also depositing snow or ice onto public or private property carries a fine of \$200 and up to \$700! If you wish to review the Clean and Clear By-law it can be found on our website at www.zorra.ca

ZORRA HUNTING REGULATIONS

Sunday Gun Hunting in the Township of Zorra is prohibited. For further information visit the Ministry of Natural Resources website: www.mnr.gov.on.ca In accordance with Township By-law #43-09, Municipal licenses are not required for hunting rabbit and pheasant in the Township of Zorra.





Living in a beautiful rural community like Zorra means living in close proximity with wildlife. That's usually something we enjoy, but from time-to-time wildlife can pose concerns.

We've been getting a lot of calls into the office about raccoons lately. Here are a few things to remember:

- If you see a raccoon behaving strangely, do not approach it. Give it ample space, and make sure to keep children and pets well away. The raccoon will most likely move along on its own, given time.
- If you have a raccoon that is hanging around and not moving on from your property, you will need to contact a pest control company to have it removed. The municipality does not remove raccoons (or skunks, etc.) from private property.
- The Humane Society will pick up injured wildlife from private properties and there is no fee for this service.

To help keep your kids and pets safe:

- Don't encourage raccoons to visit your yard. Don't leave any food out, and keep your recycling and waste containers secure until your collection day.
- Talk to your children and tell them not to approach wild animals.
- Walk your dog on a leash, and make sure to check for raccoons before you let your pets outside in your yard.
- As raccoons may carry distemper, make sure that your pets have been vaccinated against the disease.

PRE-AUTHORIZED PAYMENT PLAN FOR YOUR TAXES

Sign up now for the quarterly, 10 or 12-month Pre-Authorized Payment Plan for 2023.

If you are interested in enrolling in this payment plan for 2023, you can find an authorization form on our website at www.zorra.ca or call Lynda at 519-485-2490 ext 7222. Applications need to be submitted as soon as possible to ensure enrolment for 2023.

If you are currently enrolled in the pre-authorized payment plan, you DO NOT have to re-apply each year, only if there is a change with the account. We require 30 days notice of change.

ON-LINE OR TELEPHONE BANKING

Online or telephone banking is available. All banks accept Zorra as a client and the account number required is your ROLL NUMBER from your tax bill, starting after 3227. For example, 012-010-13100-0000, you would enter this as 01201013100, if an error occurs, please add the extra four zeros at the end and try again.

2023 PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

Property Taxes for the 2023 taxation year will continue to be based on the January 1, 2016 valuation date. Property assessments will remain the same as they were for the 2022 tax year, unless there has been changes to your property.



How to safely dispose of household hazardous waste

Safe disposal of hazardous waste helps to protect you, waste collectors, and the environment.

This is because hazardous materials can pose a variety of risks, from skin damage on contact to ground water and soil contamination. Flammable hazardous materials like propane tanks and batteries have also been known to cause fires when they are compressed in collection vehicles or at waste management facilities.

Know what it is

Automotive fluids, batteries, fluorescent lights, fuel, household cleaners, expired medicines and prescriptions, mercury thermostats, paints and solvents, propane tanks and syringes are all considered hazardous waste.

Know where it goes

Some empty hazardous waste containers can safely be disposed of in your blue box (recycling), such as emptied aerosol cans and empty metal paint cans with the lid off (empty plastic paint cans should go in the garbage).




